What's been happening at CHF

There have been so many great community initiatives showing support for patients through the Foundation in the past few months!

Canberra Coles stores ran an in-store donation drive, raising nearly \$30,000 to support paediatric patients through the Curing Homesickness initiative. Thanks to this donation, patients at the Centenary Hospital for Women and Children will have access to Smileyscopes – wearable virtual reality goggles which will provide distraction for patients undergoing treatments that involve needle procedures.

Needles can cause a lot of anxiety for patients and this anxiety can increase the pain and suffering associated with treatment, as well as cause distress for parents and caregivers.

The introduction of Smileyscopes will greatly impact children – the fun, colourful, and interactive virtual reality experience will ultimately make the procedures less distressing for patients, caregivers and healthcare workers alike. A big thank you to Coles and customers of Coles for supporting this initiative!

Each year the CFMEU ACT Children's Healthcare Trust supports paediatric patients through their flag fundraiser. Flags are purchased by CFMEU members and flown proudly at their construction sites throughout the city, while they continue raising funds.

A MOMENT WITH

... SUE RODDEN

Sue Rodden has been creating blankets for patients through the Donation Station since 2017. Her colourful creations are always a big hit, brightening the beds and bringing warmth and comfort to patients in hospital. Since starting, Sue has donated nearly 240 blankets to the Foundation! That is no small feat! We caught up with Sue to learn more about her volunteerism and her passion for helping people.

HOW DID YOU FIRST GET INVOLVED WITH THE DS?

Prior to getting involved I was working as a volunteer. This was before I retired completely, I was working in our business and working a couple of days a week at the Salvation Army Op Shop in Fyshwick. I did that for nine and a half years. And during that time I crocheted blankets for my family and friends and the wonderful people in the organisation. I was also crocheting for Clare Holland House. It was sad, because people at Clare Holland House were nearing the end of their lives, but it made them happy. I got involved with CHF in February 2017. I was formally

introduced to CHF by a friend – a neighbour who was a volunteer at the Hospital. I asked my friend if there was anyone at the hospital I could contact about giving to the patients. Really quickly she came back to me about the Foundation, and then I was up and running!

Then I just kept giving to the Foundation - 10 at a time. Occasionally I'll make a blanket for a friend but they're usually always for patients.

HOW LONG DOES IT TAKE YOU TO MAKE EACH BLANKET?

I make three blankets at a time and I estimate it takes 2 weeks to finish them all. I watch TV while making them, and the wool just takes over the lounge room!

On first count I think I've made about 370 blankets of which 240 have been donated to the Foundation.

I'm lucky in that my husband is very supportive of what I do with these blankets, he strongly encourages me all the time. I'll finish a blanket and I'll say "what do you think of this one" and he says "it's beautiful, oh it's beautiful."

HOW LONG HAVE YOU BEEN KNITTING FOR?

I learnt to knit at 10 years old and crocheting came later. My grandmother used to crochet handkerchiefs. It always fascinated me. I never learnt to do any fancy crocheting. I like to jazz it up with the colour.

I look for the brightest wool I can find because these patients, they're in hospital, it's sad to be in there, they need some cheering up! I've been in Canberra Hospital a couple of times myself and I felt as though I wanted to be cheered up.

HOW DOES IT MAKE YOU FEEL KNOWING YOUR DONATIONS ARE BRINGING COMFORT AND WARMTH TO PATIENTS?

Well I feel happy. Although I don't know who receives my blankets at the hospital, each of my blankets is made with love and care. And I do that, I look at my blankets and think, "oh gee that's a lovely one," "oh I like that one!"

Especially if the blanket goes to a person at the end of their life, I hope that it brings them some comfort.

WHAT WOULD YOU SAY TO ANYONE THINKING OF DONATING/ GETTING INVOLVED?

I met a lot of people who were volunteering at the hospital. One lady there really inspired me in the early stages, she was a harp player. I thought that she was wonderful.

If you've got the time, and I'm sure you have if you're retired, you have to. People may be volunteering even if they don't realise it, even if they're just teaching another person a new skill like how to play bowls.

My life has been made better because I have volunteered. Much better. I honestly think it doesn't take much spending a few hours helping someone else. No matter how small your contribution may be, in volunteering, it is all appreciated. We've each got something we can give.

TEDDIES BRING COMFORT AFTER COVID19 TESTING
